- Ensure that carers are aware of their rights and entitlements.
- Reduce social isolation and exclusion of carers supporting someone living in the Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames.

Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and was incorporated on 25 January 2013 and operates in accordance with its written Memorandum and Articles of Association. Objectives and Activities

Purpose

The purpose of Kingston Carers' Network is to provide support and advice to carers of people living in the Royal Borough of Kingston who cannot cope without their help due to illness, disability, mental health problems or substance addiction. As such, the charity is a public benefit entity and the trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance of public benefit.

Target Group – Definition

A carer is someone of any age who provides unpaid support to family or friends who could not manage without this help. This could be caring for a relative, partner or friend who is ill, frail, disabled or has mental health or substance misuse problems. A carer may also be juggling paid work with their unpaid caring responsibilities at home.

Anyone can become a carer; carers come from all walks of life, all cultures and can be of any age, including children.

The 2011 Census indicated that there are 13,288 adult carers supporting someone in the borough of Kingston and we expect the 2021 figures to be considerably higher. According to research by Carers UK, 81% of carers are providing more care than at the beginning of the pandemic and 72% have had no access to respite breaks.

Activities

The charity provides a comprehensive and holistic range of services and this has developed in consultation with carers and other stakeholders. We have adopted the five outcomes pledged by the Government in the National Carers' Strategy:

- Not financially disadvantaged
- Mentally and physically well; treated with dignity
- Recognised and supported as an expert partner
- Enjoying a life outside caring
- Children thriving, protected from inappropriate caring roles

Our current services have been adapted to include virtual support and have continued throughout the challenging circumstances of this period. They include:

- Independent information, advice and advocacy.
- Specialist mental health and substance misuse carers' service.
- Young Carers' Project.
- Targeted Support Project
- Young Adult Carers' Project
- Out-of-hours advice service.
- Help with benefits, grants and allowances.
- Signposting and referral to other services.
- Emotional support.
- Counselling.
- Outings and social activities.
- Programme of health and wellbeing activities.
- Complementary therapies.
- Support groups.
- Training and information sessions.
- Carers' Assessments carried out on behalf of Kingston's Adult Social Care.

Achievements and Performance

Adult Carers

This year we have supported over 4,000 carers across all our services. We saw a total of 1,050 adult carer referrals to our Advice Service. We provided over 3,804 face-to-face advice sessions to adult carers on a wide range of issues. A key outcome of our advice service is to reduce the financial hardship of carers. This year we secured an additional £1,116,986 of new income for Kingston's carers and families.

Other key outcomes for adult carers included:

- 339 Carers' Assessments and Annual Reviews were carried out by the Adult Carers' Advice team on behalf of the Royal Borough of Kingston.
- 1,179 attendances at our carers' social and wellbeing events. Many of these were virtual, but included fitness, cooking, sewing packs and photography.
- 52 virtual peer support groups were held for carers including: parent carers; carers of adults with mental health problems; carers of children with ADHD and carers of adults with Asperger's Syndrome.

Feedback from carers provides evidence that we are achieving our key objectives. This year:

81% of carers said they had an improved understanding of their rights.

769 carers are now recognised as expert care partners.

458carers are now enjoying a life outside of caring.

478 carers have improved mental and physical health.

598 carers had reduced financial hardship.

Young Carers

There were 76 young carers referred to our Young Carers' Project, and we provided 4,159 respite breaks for 749 young carers at 405 activities.

Some of our key achievements for this most unusual year include:

- · Regular activity packs sent to all young carers
- You tube channel with our activities, including Zumba, football and cooking
- young carers' activities and outings were organised as a peer support holiday programme.
- individual respite breaks were provided.
- Virtual drop-ins held for young carers aged 5-8.
- young carers aged 9 to 12 attended regular virtual drop-ins.
- young carers aged 12 and over attended virtual youth group.
- one to one support sessions were held with young carers.
- Covid secure face to face groups and activities held whenever regulations allowed
- Science project, Curiosity ran regular activities, both virtual and face to face when possible.
- Food parcels were delivered weekly to families.
- Targeted support was provided to young carers with complex needs.
- Young adult carers aged 16+ attended regular sessions.
- Mentoring project provided one to one support.

- Transition group for young carers moving to secondary school.
- Young carers and families were supported in multi-agency meetings

Volunteering Project

This year, we were supported by 68 volunteers who contributed their time and skills in a variety of roles. Volunteers gave over 1,806 hours of their time, which represents a saving in staff costs of around £36,120.

The valuable contribution made by our volunteers enables us to expand the service we offer carers and was especially valuable this year as we all adapted to new circumstances. Highlights from our volunteering project include:

- Our activity volunteers spent 155 hours creating and delivering activity packs to young carers.
- Our volunteer drivers spent 106 hours delivering food boxes
- Our admin volunteers provided 385 hours of administrative support.
- Our volunteers provided 133 weekly shopping for isolated carers.
- Our team of student counsellors provided 401 one-to-one online or telephone counselling sessions to carers, saving them £20,050.
- Our new service of telephone befrienders provided 383 hours of one-to-one listening.

Financial Review

This has been an unusual year in many ways. We were able to access significant sums from the London Community Response Fund and additional funds from RBK for direct interventions due to the pandemic, which was most welcome. It has been tougher, however, to access secure longer-term resources as many funders took the opportunity to reconsider and realign their priorities.

We were very grateful to the Big Lottery for extending our grant by 5 months and to Trust for London who are providing three years of support from April 2020. As always, we truly appreciate the generosity of our other donors, including RBK, Achieving for Children, City Bridge, Lloyds Bank Foundation, Children in Need, Wellcome Children in Need Curiosity Fund and the GLA

As demands on carers continue to grow, particularly within the parameters of the pandemic, it is essential that we sustain and expand our support to meet increasing need. We are committed to providing high quality and comprehensive support to those who need it.

As always, we are continuing to pursue new streams of funding, but statutory funding is scarce and charitable funding is competitive; often targeted to areas of work outside of our remit.

We are delighted that Henry Smith has agreed to fund KCN over the next three years to support our work with young carers. We plan to start this project in October 2021. However, we do need to replace other project funding as and when grants come to an end. Funding will continue to be our strategic priority going forward to ensure we can support as many local carers as possible.

Chairman's Report for the year ended 31 March 2021

Kingston Carers' Network (A company limited by guarantee)

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Kingston Carers' Network (KCN) is a Company Limited by Guarantee and, since its incorporation on 25th January 2013, the charitable company has been administered by its Board of Trustees, who are also Directors of KCN for the purposes of Company Law. As such, they are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the organisation's financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company Law requires the Trustees to prepare annual financial statements that provide a true and fair view of the charitable company's state of affairs, its incoming resources, and the application of those resources, including income and expenditure over the period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed,
subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
Prepare the financial statements on a going-concern basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company, and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company, and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The Trustees are responsible for maintaining the integrity of the financial statements.

As stated below, KCN continues to seek additional Trustees, especially those who have relevant experience and skills that would benefit the organisation. Trustees are recruited based on their skills and experience. All new Trustees are taken through an induction procedure to ensure they understand their responsibilities and have sound knowledge of KCN's policies and procedures.

Overview of 20/21

We began the financial year, like every other organisation, in lockdown due to the Covid-19 pandemic. However, whilst our offices were closed, staff worked remotely and continued to offer advice, guidance, and support to carers in the borough using zoom and phone calls. The Board of Trustees were delighted with the response of Diane (CEO) and her team in rapidly adapting to online delivery of our services and ensuring our standards of support were maintained in a safe manner. However, the Board were not the only ones impressed by the staff response – our Young Carers Team were awarded a special Mayor's Covid Award (March 2021) in recognition of the "outstanding support that has been shown to local residents during the pandemic". The pandemic hit our young carers particularly hard. A major concern was the loss of schooling for many of them who were unable to return to school when most of their peers did, due to the people they care for still being required to shield and the fear of bringing home the virus.

The board used the year to focus upon updating our policy documents, re-assessing our risks, honing our accounting processes & reporting, and developing a new communications strategy. With respect to the latter, I am particularly grateful for the help and advice from our former Chair, Thomas Braun, who acted as a consultant on this particularly important piece of work. As a result, we now have a strategy that not only has identified our key messages and data that supports our achievements but, most importantly, ensures that KCN's role is especially well understood by those key stakeholders who will influence the future of carer support in the borough.

I'd like also to take this opportunity to thank our local MP, the Rt. Hon. Ed Davey for tabling an Early Day Motion in parliament during Carers' Week 2021 that raised the issues around support for unpaid carers. He recognised that carers have been under extraordinary pressure during the Coronavirus pandemic and that many of the challenges that unpaid carers face have intensified since March 2020. Furthermore, he highlighted the fact that that 81 per cent of carers have spent more time on their caring responsibilities and two thirds of carers had not had any breaks at all since the beginning of the pandemic. During this opening speech in the debate, Ed specifically acknowledged the work of KCN. It is heart-warming to know we have this kind of support, and our voice is being heard.

The funding landscape has become ever more challenging with many funders focusing on specific Covid-19 projects. We did receive an additional award from the Royal Borough of Kingston from its Winter Covid Fund which was a very flexible grant used for emergency items for those carers who were struggling to get by during lockdown. Indeed, during this year of the pandemic, we have been very grateful to the Royal Borough of Kingston for their enormous support, both advice and guidance as well as financial. Our relationship has developed into a true partnership, and we look forward to continuing to work with the council in the best interests of all carers.

The KCN Team

Firstly, I would like to congratulate our trustee Ms. Sushila Abraham on becoming the Mayor of the Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames. This is a huge honour, not only for Sushila, but also for KCN.

As I indicated in last year's report, we appointed a new Treasurer, Mr. Manuel Boger who took over from Bob Humphries in June 2020. In addition, we are extremely grateful to volunteer Mr Peter Whatnall, who has played the key role in streamlining our accounting processes and managing the accounts.

Diane (CEO) and former CEO, Kate Dudley, continued to work tirelessly in writing bids and liaising closely with grant-giving bodies. Details will available elsewhere in this report, but we are particularly grateful to RBK for several awards, Carers Trust, London Community Emergency Fund, Rotary Club, The Wates Foundation, Lloyds Foundation, Children in Need, Community Fund (former Big Lottery).

Diane, David Still (Deputy CEO) and the KCN Staff team have done an outstanding job, particularly given the lockdown, and converting to remote working. The Trustees recognise how much their knowledge, dedication and support are valued. The Board would like to register its thanks to all staff members, as well as to the many volunteers who give freely of their time and talents in support of KCN's work. Our biggest appreciation though is reserved for the carers themselves. We are confident in the knowledge that whatever the long-term impact of the pandemic will be on unpaid carers in the borough, Diane and her team will lead us through these challenges, with her customary care, compassion, expertise, and professionalism.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR TO 31 MARCH 2021

1 Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

2 Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- Preparation of a cash flow statement

3 Accounting Policies

a) Income

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant. Income received prior to the period the funding covers is deferred until the period starts.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Gifts donated for resale are included as incoming resources within activities for generating funds when they are sold.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

b) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management. They are split using the number of staff hours spent on the main projects.

 $\textbf{c)} \quad \text{Expenditure of a capital nature of less than $\pounds 1,000$ is not capitalised but treated as expended in the year}$

Tangible fixed assets are stated at their historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Improvements to the buildings are capitalised. Depreciation is provided over the expected useful lives and the term of the leases, as applicable, under the straight-line method. Depreciation is provided from the date an asset comes into use.

d) The charity is exempt for tax purposes.

 The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contribution payable by the charity during the year.
- f) Debtors are measured at transaction value less any impairment. At each balance sheet date, debtors are assessed for objective evidence of impairment. If an asset is impaired, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the carrying amount and the amount expected to be received.
- g) Creditors are measured at transaction value.

The Chair invited everyone to read at leisure the full Chairman's Report printed on page 9 of the Annual Report, regarding the strategic growth of Kingston Carers' Network.

It has been a transitional year for KCN, with major change to the management structure with the introduction of Diane White and David Still as CEO and Deputy CEO, and the appointment of Jo Cocup as Company Secretary. We have also been impacted heavily by the effects of Covid-19 and the various restrictions and lockdowns that have taken place. Internal appointments have meant that KCN has remained agile and been able to accommodate change quickly to meet these challenges. The Board has been delighted with the new structure, transferring the executive function from the Trustees to management, creating a team fit for purpose.

There have also been new appointments to the Board, seeking to diversify our membership on our journey to further represent the demographic of the Borough.

The accounts management has been a mammoth task, and the Board gave huge thanks to Bob Humphries for all his hard work. More of the finance function will be moved back to the office, with Manuel overseeing the process and transition.

Fundraising has also played a huge part in KCNs success. The Board gave thanks to Kate Dudley for all her hard work involved with grants, and thanks to all the organisations who have funded our activities over the last year. Particular thanks were given to the Lloyds Bank Foundation for providing funding, computer hardware and support with advice and training.

We are now starting to see the full impact on the mental health of carers due to Covid-19 and have been concerned with the effect of missed schooling on young carers, and this will be a focus for KCN in the year ahead. The Chair invited everyone to contact him for further information.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, the Chair gave huge thanks to all members of staff and volunteers who support KCN, giving particular thanks to Diane, David and Jo.

Chief Executive's Report - Diane White

2019/20 was another great year for KCN. See Annual Report for Diane White's full CEO Report. Key highlights included:

- 1,495 adult carers referred to KCN
- 146 young carers referred to YCP
- Over 4,700 face-to-face advice sessions provided to adult carers
- Additional £698k of new income secured for carers

- New funding secured from Children in Need/Wellcome Foundation for young carers' services.
- Volunteers contributed over 2,700 hours of their time
- Over £110k emergency Covid funding

KCN has supported our carers through the challenges of the Covid pandemic, particularly their mental health needs.
